Facts:

- a. On 04 January 2008, I was appointed as an investigating officer (IO) pursuant to Army Regulation (AR) 15-6 (Procedures for Investigating Officers and Boards of Officers) to conduct an informal investigation as a more senior investigating officer into an escalation of force (EOF) incident that occurred on 22 October 2007, on (b)(2)High Coalition Outpost (COP) Callahan, Baghdad, Iraq, and involved members of Foxtrot Company (F Co), 2nd Battalion, 325th Airborne Infantry Regiment (2-325th AIR), 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division. Specifically, a member of the COP Callahan guard force used deadly force to stop a local national walking toward the COP Callahan Entry Control Point (ECP) after the local national failed to adhere to EOF procedures. The local national was shot one time with (b)(2)High and taken to 28th Combat Surgical Hospital, Baghdad, Iraq where he was pronounced dead on arrival. I included First Lieutenant (ILT) the original AR 15-6 Investigating Officer, findings (b)(3), b(6)and original investigation into this investigation (See Exhibits 11 and 12). My investigation is designed to expand upon ILT (b)(3), b(6) findings and provide recommendations accordingly.
- b. At approximately 1720 on 22 October 2007, a local national (LN) passed through a highly visible and appropriately marked boom gate or (b)(2)High that identifies a Coalition Force vehicular entry way into COP Callahan. The LN and the gate were clearly visible without the need for optics because the weather was clear and during that time of year it was still day time (Exhibit 13). At the time of the incident, signs were posted that clearly warned LNs in Arabic that the boom gate was an entrance to a Coalition Forces COP and that unauthorized individuals would be perceived as a threat (See Exhibit 3). Also, LNs had written in Arabic on some of the barriers around the entrance that LNs entering the (b)(2)High entry way would be shot. During the eight months prior to this incident, thousands of LNs were processed through the COP Callahan entry ways without incident (See Exhibit 3 and 11). However, very few LNs attempted to enter COP Callahan through the (b)(2)High entry, which seems to be due to previous EOF incidents along (b)(2)High, the fact that the entry way is clearly marked and used primarily by Coalition Force vehicles.
- c. Prior to and during this EOF incident, COP Callahan was under a heightened threat level. In response to the increased threat to COP Callahan. (b)(2) High (b)(2) High

incident on 22 October 2007 (b)(2)High which consisted of Sergeant (SGT (b)(3)(b)(6) (b)(3)(b)(6) and SGT (b)(3)(b)(6) ioth assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Company (HHC), 2-325th AIR), was tasked primarily with (b)(2)High

(b)(3), b(6) was the first guard to see the LN pass the (b)(2)High coom gate and immediately assessed that the LN might pose an immediate threat to COP Callahan. Shortly after the LN crossed the boom gate, SGT (b)(3), b(6) told SGT(b)(3), b(6)to radio the situation to the Battalion's tactical operations center (TOC) while he started EOF procedures by (b)(2)High

(b)(2)High (See Exhibit 11).

- d. SGT (b)(3), b(6)the Roof Guard Force NCOIC at the time of the incident, immediately moved to the west side of the roof of COP Callahan after seeing Guard Position 3 (b)(2)High see Exhibit 2 and 11). Upon reaching the edge of the roof, SGT (b)(3), b(6) saw the LN walking north of (b)(2)High within the entry way and immediately attempted to get the LN's attention by yelling at him and using hand and arm signals (See Exhibits 2 and 11). The LN disregarded these EOF measures and used his hand to as he continued to walk through the ECP. Also, (b)(2)High the LN moveu closer to the concrete partiers in an effort to shield himself from (b)(2)High and Coalition Forces. When the LN walked next to the concrete barriers he was concealed from (b)(2)High and other roof top guards, which prompted SGT (b)(3), b(6) to fire two warning shots to the front of the LN into a HESCO barrier (See Exhibits 2, 11 and 12). The LN did not stop his advance or turn around; instead he continued north towards staying close to the barrier wall. Due to the 12' height of the wall, and the angle of the Roof Guard's line of sight, much of the LN was not visible until he reached (See Exhibits 2, 3, 11 and 12).
- e. When the LN reached (b)(2)High he proceeded east, at which point the Roof Guards regained sight of him and immediately implemented EOF measures (b)(2)High (b)(2)High See Exhibits 2, 3, 5, 11, 12 and 13). Although the LN acknowledged the efforts of the guards by looking toward their positions, he failed to modify his course and continued unabated east on After continuing east on (b)(2)High for approximately(2)Himeters the LN stopped in the section of the ECP that is closest to the main building on COP Callahan, turned toward COP Callahan and raised his right arm (See Exhibits 2, 11, 12, and 13). At this point, only the LN's upper torso and raised right arm were visible to SGT (b)(3), b(6) (See Exhibit 2 and 12). The LN stood across from a row of portable latrines located just inside the barrier wall which separated him from the COP. Although it is unknown whether the LN knew that he was on the opposite side of the barriers from the latrines, he would have known that he was standing in the section of the ECP closest to the main building on COP Callahan. While the LN remained stationary, SGT (b)(3), b(6) of his own volition and without guidance from the TOC, fired one shot into the LN's torso (See Exhibits 2, 3, 5, 11 and 12). SGT (b)(3), b(6) stated that he believed the LN was an imminent threat because of the LN's actions, the heightened threat, the LN's disregard for every EOF measure employed against him, his briefing by the Sergeant of the Guard (SOG), the SOPs being enforced, and the close proximity of the latrines to the LN (See Exhibits 2 and 12).

Findings:

a. Immediately after I received my appointment orders, I watched the Raid Tower Video of the shooting (See Exhibit 13). My initial reaction to the video was that the shooting was not authorized

involved in this incident I find that the EOF measures, to include SGT (b)(3), b(6) use of

past a clearly identified and marked entry point that has successfully deterred LNs from entering COP Callahan from (b)(2)High for approximately eight months; 2. The LN ignored and attempted to avoid all EOF measures, including two warning shots; 3. COP Callahan is located in a highly volatile area of Adhamiyah and has been attacked numerous times; 4. At the time of the incident, COP Callahan was under a heightened state of alert; 5. The LN walked deliberately up (b)(2)High turned on then stopped when he was at the closest point to COP Callahan, which happened to be just outside of the wall from the COP's latrines; and 6. Every roof top guard that physically had eyes on the LN perceived that he posed an imminent threat to COP Callahan and felt that SGT (b)(3), b(6) actions were appropriate (I have excluded from this assessment the opinions of the individuals watching the incident on the Raid Tower camera because their vantage point, being approximatel b)(2)Higfeet above the highest roof top guard, and their perception were different than that of the guards). Based upon these facts I find that SGT (b)(3), b(6) in his role as the Roof Guard NCOIC, was justified in his use of a lethal shot; (b)(2)High

- b. During the course of my investigation, I found no specific wrong doing or negligence on the part of SGT (b)(3), b(6) or any other member of the Roof Guards. However, some concerning allegations regarding SGT (b)(3), b(6) character came to light and require further discussion. During the initial investigation Specialist (SPC) (b)(3), b(6) (b)(3), b(6) and SPC (b)(3), b(6) stated that SGT (b)(3), b(6) had a history of voicing his dislike for Iraq and Iraqis in both a serious and joking manner; most notably a few months prior to the shooting SGT (b)(3), b(6) stated that "he wanted to kill Iraqis" (See Exhibit 12). Both Soldiers provided this information because they felt the comments were relevant and may have played a part in SGT (b)(3), b(6) decision making process on 22 October 2007 (See Exhibits 8, 9 and 12). While it is possible that SGT (b)(3), b(6) has a genuine dislike for Iraq and Iraqis, I could find no evidence to find that these negative beliefs influenced SGT (b)(3), b(6) decision to employ deadly force against the LN on 22 October 2007.
- c. During a post incident After Action Review (AAR), SGT (b)(3), b(6) conveyed that he thought the unit was too lenient on LN's around the COP. Additionally, a comment was made to me that SGT (b)(3), b(6) was bragging about the shooting to Sergeant First Class (b)(3)(b)(6) HHC, 407th Brigade Support Battalion, 2-82 ABN, during a visit to COP Callahan. On 5 February 2008, SFC b)(3), b(6) in a sworn statement, stated that he spoke with SGT (b)(3), b(6) about the shooting, but at no time did he feel that SGT (b)(3), b(6) was bragging about the incident (See Exhibit 14). Although there is some evidence that SGT (b)(3), b(6) is vocal in his dislike for Iraq and Iraqis, this evidence is not sufficient to find that these morally questionable beliefs were a factor on 22 October 2007. Instead, the evidence shows that SGT (b)(3), b(6) used deadly force against a local national who disregarded a variety of EOF procedures and appeared to pose an imminent threat to a military installation located in a highly volatile area of Baghdad, Iraq.
- d. In the storyboard for this EOF incident it states that the Mayor was notified as was a family member of the deceased LN. No confirmation to these acts was presented, specifically that a family member was contacted as stated on the Battalion released

storyboard. To date, the unit has not been contacted by a family member regarding the deceased LN and no claim has been submitted.

- 1. In accordance with Army Regulation (AR) 15-6, paragraph 2-3, I have reviewed the additional AR 15-6 investigation into an escalation of force (EOF) incident that occurred on 22 October 2007, on (b)(2)High outside of Combat Outpost (COP) Callahan, Baghdad, Iraq, and involved members of 2nd Battalion, 325th Airborne Infantry Regiment (2-325th AIR), 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division (2-82 ABN). Specifically, a member of the COP Callahan guard force used deadly force to stop a local national walking toward the COP Callahan Entry Control Point (ECP) after the local national failed to adhere to EOF procedures. The local national was shot one time with an)(2)Higand taken to a local hospital where he died of his wound.
- 2. On 28 December 2007, I provided a written legal review of the original AR 15-6 investigation, which detailed some concerns regarding some of the investigating officers findings. Specifically, the evidence did not support the original investigating officer's finding that the local national was engaging in a hostile act or exhibiting hostile intent at the time he was shot. Part of this assessment was based upon allegations raised, but not thoroughly investigated, regarding Sergeant (SGT) (b)(3), b(6) the roof top guard that shot the local national, motivation for shooting the local national. After thoroughly reviewing all of the evidence uncovered during both investigations, I have modified my initial stance and make the following determinations:
 - a. The proceedings comply with the legal requirements of AR 15-6.
- b. Errors in the proceedings, if any, do not have a material adverse effect on any individual's substantial rights as related to an informal AR 15-6 investigation.
 - c. Sufficient evidence supports the findings for an informal AR 15-6 investigation.
 - d. The recommendations are consistent with the findings.

SUBJECT: Appointment as AR 15-6 Investigating Officer (2-82 125 Part II)

1. You are hereby appointed as an investigating officer pursuant to Army Regulation (AR) 15-6 (Procedures for Investigating Officers and Boards of Officers) to conduct an informal investigation into an escalation of force (EOF) incident that occurred on 22 October 2007, on outside of Combat Outpost (COP) Callahan, Baghdad, Iraq, and involved members of Foxtrot Company (F Co), 2nd Battalion, 325th Airborne Infantry Regiment (2-325th AIR), 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division. Specifically, a member of the COP Callahan guard force used deadly force to stop a local national walking toward the COP Callahan Entry Control Point after the local national failed to adhere to EOF procedures. The local national was shot one time with (b)(2)High and taken to a local hospital where he died of his wound. On 23 October 2007, I appointed First Lieutenant (b)(3), b(6) to conduct an informal investigation into this matter. On 1 January 2008, I disapproved 1LT (b)(3), b(6) findings and recommendations in order to appoint a more senior investigating officer. This is your primary duty until properly relieved. You are required to expand upon the initial investigation and provide specific findings on the following:

- a. Provide a detailed analysis of the facts and circumstances of the incident.
- b. Describe the events leading up to the escalation of force (EOF) incident. Include a description of the specific EOF measures employed, if any, prior to the use of warning shots or lethal force. Additionally, include as much information as possible about the local national that was killed as a result of the use of EOF procedures and any property damaged during the use of EOF procedures.
- c. Since deadly force was used by Coalition Forces, describe in as much detail as is readily available why Sergeant (SGT (b)(3), b(6) F Co, 2-325th AIR, engaged the local national with deadly force. Specifically, what did the local national do or fail to do that prompted SGT (b)(3), b(6) to believe that the local national was engaging in a hostile act and/or demonstrating hostile intent? For instance, since the individual was not visibly carrying a weapon and was traveling on foot, what imminent threat did SGT (b)(3), b(6) believe the individual posed?

- d. Several members of the COP Callahan Guard Force stated in the original investigation that they believed the individual displayed hostile intent or was engaging in a hostile act. Given that the local national was not visibly carrying a weapon and was traveling on foot, what imminent threat did they believe the local national posed? Then determine why they did not engage the local national with deadly force in order to neutralize the imminent threat.
- e. From the angle at which SGT (b)(3), b(6) was located on the roof, determine how much of the local national he could see and for how long prior to shooting him?
- f. The raid tower video shows that after EOF measures were used, but just prior to being shot, the local nation stopped, faced COP Callahan and raised a hand. To what extent was this action visible to those Paratroopers on the roof, including SGT (b)(3), b(6) and what was the interpretation of that action?
- g. Was this incident being viewed in the Battalion TOC as it occurred? If so, determine what, if any direction or oversight they provided to the rooftop guards?
- h. Determine what, if any, effort was made by the Battalion to detain the local national. If no effort was made, determine why.
- i. Were any efforts made to communicate with the local national using an interpreter? If not, why not?
- j. In the original AR 15-6 investigation two Troopers mentioned in their sworn statements that SGT (b)(3), b(6) hates Iraqis and wants to kill them. Why did they feel compelled to mention this? Determine whether these statements were made by SGT (b)(3), b(6) and in what context and determine what, if any, bearing these sentiments had on this incident.
- k. What additional EOF measures, if any, should have been attempted prior to engaging the local national?
- Include any other facts or findings that the command should be aware of to assist Troopers with handling similar incidents in the future.
- 2. You will speak with any and all individuals you believe have information pertinent to your investigation. You will obtain a legal briefing from the Brigade Judge Advocate prior to conducting your investigation. You should also familiarize yourself with the provisions of AR 15-6 and the Guide for Informal Investigations. Once your investigation is complete, you will make recommendations consistent with your findings.
- All witness statements will be sworn if possible and recorded on DA Form 2823. If circumstances preclude you from obtaining a sworn statement, you will summarize the testimony in a memorandum and attest to the accuracy of your summary.
